Kingdom Life, formerly Sharon Church and Youth Centre, are an Old Trafford-based community that currently has a local landmark church and facility on Chorlton Road. Their mission: Restoring the Spirit, Renewing the Soul, Rebuilding Lives, Replicating Kingdom Life.

Kingdom Life are more than a church, they provide a hub for the surrounding community to congregate, help each other and reach out to build real relationships with those in need in Manchester, through Sunday morning gatherings, BBQs, walks out in the wilderness, or exercise in the gym.

The site currently consists of a church, built in 1877, and a youth centre, built in 1972, with a large amount of surrounding land. The site is located adjacent to Merlins Park, and a mix of high-rise housing and 2-storey terraced housing, and a number of historic buildings that are now used as an industrial estate. Kingdom Life would like to expand these facilities to accommodate a larger community on site, enhancing their current programme with classrooms, an industrial kitchen, a multifunctional hall, a gym, and short-term housing, both for local students and for anyone looking to rebuild their lives with Kingdom Life. New Space, New Song

New Space, New Song is a strategic planning project, collaborating with the Old Trafford-based church and youth centre, Kingdom Life. Kingdom Life provides support for community members to learn, play, and grow through their adult educational programmes, community services, and youth centre facility with space for education in the arts, sports, and building children's futures. The core members of Kingdom Life are doing a fantastic job of this already but feel limited by their existing facilities: 1) the congregation hall is too small, and has inappropriate circulation that is distracting for those in worship, and limited supporting amenities for the hall's functions. 2) The youth centre is not appealing to the youth community and has limited flexibility for different types of learning activities. 3) there is a broken connection between the church and the youth centre, and limited usefulness of the current surrounding land

The collaborative project was for Kingdom Life to get some help from the MSA students to visualize an overall site strategy for the community base to expand, both by maximizing the potential of the existing facilities, and by adding new spaces, suitable for the diverse community's needs. Please continue through this publication to see how our two action weeks went, and how our proposed site strategy was developed.

UNDERSTANDING The site

Our project site is located on Kingdom Life and Sharon Youth Center. It's in southwest of Manchester city center. At the beginning of the project, we visited the site as a team and conducted documentation and research on the surrounding area and the interior of the buildings. Through observation and communication with collaborators, we gained a comprehensive understanding of the current state of the site. Based on the site visit, we created sketches of the site, made collages depicting the site, and produced site analysis diagrams, showcasing everyone's understanding of the design possibilities for the site.








CONCEPT SITE STRATEGY 1

The first oncept site strategy is focused on retaining the existing buildings and extending them to fit in the increased building programme. A new glazed entrance was proposed between both buildings along with an extension to the side of the existing church and and extension to the front of the youth centre to help create an active frontage.


Image on top: Concept strategy diagram showing the idea about extension

CONCEPT FLOOR PLAN LAYOUT




CONCEPT SITE STRATEGY 2


Our second design strategy focused on removing the existing youth center and church on the site and constructing a new community center and student dormitories. In this strategy, our principle is to align the main portion of the building along Chorlton Road side and enclose a garden space on the western side of the site, closer to the community. Additionally. we aim to establish a connection between the garden area and the main entrance, as well as the main road, by creating an entrance space that spans across the building in an east-west direction.

CONCEPT FLOOR PLAN LAYOUT







CONCEPT Site Strategy 3


The third design strategy advocates for the preservation of the historically significant and visually stunning church building while redesigning and constructing the community space currently occupied by the youth center. In this strategy, we propose retaining the main space of the church and expanding it. Simultaneously, we aim to remove the existing youth center and construct a new community center and student dormitories in its original area. We intend to preserve the entrance space between the church and the community center and transform it into a vital public space that connects the two.



INITIAL DIAGRAM AND MASSING










PLAN LAYOUT DEVELOPMENT

After team discussions and consultations with collaborators, we have decided to continue with the third concept strategy as the foundation for further design development.

Based on strategy 3, we aim to incorporate an independent café space on the side adjacent to the main road, surrounded by the church to the south and the community center to the north, thus becoming the new social hub of the site. By incorporating glass corridors, our intention is to connect the main entrance facing the road, the community center, the café, the church, and the garden space at the back of the site, creating a vibrant and lively circulation space.


Plan Layout








Proposed elevation along Chorlton Road


